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From Julia Malcolm, Acting Principal



Ngā mihinui ki a koutou.

This is my last newsletter article in the role of Acting Principal as next term Ms Karen Stewart will step into the role of Principal. The Strategic Leadership team and I spent a very fruitful planning day with her last week looking at our Annual Plan for the school and the targets and aims which sit within that. Our focus remains firmly on Engagement, Achievement, Retention, and Transition – and looking at how we design learning which motivates students, allows them to direct their learning, gives them opportunities to achieve in all senses of the word, and keeps them in school so that they get maximum benefit from the education system. The final step of course is getting them to a place where they have choices for the future and a clear pathway for their transition to further study or employment.

There is plenty to celebrate in this newsletter. 'High School Musical' provided audiences with a great spectacle and it was a shining example of our students' talent. It is always uplifting to see students take the stage, some for the first time whilst others are seasoned performers. Mounting a school production is a huge undertaking and so I congratulate the staff and students in the cast and crew for their commitment. The theme song of the show "We're All in This Together" certainly rang true for all involved.

Similarly our sports' teams continue to impress and prove that Rangiora High School can foot it with the best. The boys' 1st XV rugby team is giving us plenty of excitement with wins against St Thomas, St Bede's, St Andrew's, and Shirley Boys' High School. Their recent fundraiser night showed that our school community values sport and the associated benefits it brings. At present we have 52 teams playing competitive winter sports which is mind boggling, and further reinforces the need to ensure that we have facilities that can cater for the numbers of participants and range of sports on offer. I was impressed by two teams last week who offered players to the opposition – one in junior girls' basketball where the opposition were short a player, and the other in 2nd XV rugby against Cheviot/Kaikoura to help give that team a boost.

Inter-House WinterFest and Quiz competitions were completed last week and you will be able to read about the consequent changes in the leaderboard. Whenever I run into ex-students around and about, their first question is' "Who's winning the House Competition?" It is great to see that the House competition continues to inspire students to take part, compete and have fun doing so.

The school continues to have a steady stream of visitors to Rakahuri, from all over and from both primary and secondary sectors. These teachers and school leaders are interested in Rakahuri as a building and also what is happening inside it, in terms of teaching and learning. There is certainly some interesting 'passion projects' nearing completion and I am looking forward to seeing the Year 9 classes present their work.

One of the enjoyable aspects of being a Principal is the examples of student work that are either brought to my office, shared digitally or I get invited to come and see. This last term I have been blown away by the depth in terms of thinking and the creative and professional presentation of students' work. Level 2 Media Studies students' music videos are a recent example and I spent a couple of hours with their teacher who was so proud showing me their work. I know that this is happening in all faculty areas. Learning and how we assess it looks a whole lot different these days and it is pretty exciting for our students to be using technology to make this process a whole lot more relevant, accessible, and meaningful for both them and their teacher.

An example of this is our two speakers at Manu Korēro, the regional Māori Speech Competitions. Ariana Winikerei and Hinemoa Carroll, Year 11 students who spoke in the Senior Māori and English sections respectively, both have earned Level 2 credits for their speeches. Congratulations to them both for standing in this fierce competition and representing the school with such pride and passion.

In the holiday break and as we move into winter with a vengeance, can I encourage you to take stock of your son's/daughter's uniform. Most of our students wear their uniform with pride and they look fantastic. I know that some will argue that it shouldn't matter what cap or socks a student is wearing, or that they wear hoodies, but the fact is we have a uniform, with a number of options and choices to suit all. Wearing it well is part of our school culture. Not wearing it well, is saying, "I don't care" and that is not our culture. A few basics that we would appreciate your support with as we deal with 1733 students:

- Socks are plain black
- Shoes are polishable 'leather' black or brown (clean ones would be a bonus!)
- Hats are school caps or school beanies
- Hoodies are NOT uniform
- If you need some help buying uniform, please be in touch as we can definitely help out

Last week at Manu Korēro, where almost every school in Canterbury was represented, I have to say, among the 600 students there, our uniform looked superb on the 30 students there representing us. Let's all aim to be like that, all the time. It's a habit of mind that may seem trivial, but shows allegiance, loyalty, pride, and mana.

So in closing, this week is a short one with students finishing on Thursday. All staff will be at school on Friday attending professional development sessions throughout the day. Friday night is the Year 13 Ball which is always eagerly anticipated, a pleasure to attend, and a highlight of the school calendar.

I wish the students happy holidays, and I hope they go into the break with a good half year to look back on. For me I am looking forward to the break (quite a lot actually!) and resuming my position as Deputy Principal next term. It has been a privilege to sit in this role for the past two years and I hope you feel, as I do, that the school is in good heart.

Julia has been a committed and compassionate leader, and well supported by a very capable Strategic Leadership Team. It has been a privilege to work closely with Julia and the SLT. Along with the day-to-day management of the school, as Acting Principal, Julia has fostered very strong relationships with our contributing schools to make the transition to high school seamless and enjoyable. She has also provided valuable input into the new Rangiora Community of Learning (COL). At the heart of all of Julia's decision making has been the students and staff, and this is evident in how much she is respected by both.

I know that Julia is looking forward to stepping back into her Deputy Principal role but I also know that Karen Stewart, our new Principal, is keen to continue drawing on Julia's expertise as she transitions into her new role.

Karen Stewart will officially begin as Principal in the middle of the holidays spending time getting to know the school and our systems and meeting Ministry of Education staff so that she will have the first week dedicated to meeting and getting to know the students and their aspirations for the school. There will be a formal welcome to her on Tuesday 25 July involving student leaders, students from each form class, members of the local community and a group from Marlborough Girls' College.

Last week Karen joined Julia, the SLT, Brent Ingram (our educational consultant), and me for a full-day intensive strategic planning session. We discussed the major review of faculties and teaching programmes and the achievement targets through to 2019. These targets will be on the school website next term. It was useful for everyone to spend time thinking critically about current practices and focusing on how these can be strengthened to lead to better achievement outcomes for each student. The day was incredibly useful and future-focused, ensuring everyone is fully committed to the direction we are taking at the school.

With Karen's appointment, Brent's role comes to an end. I would like to record my appreciation to Brent for providing Rangiora High School with extremely valuable analysis around student achievement data, barriers and successes. This work sits at the very core of the school's role and provides the data and base for improving student achievement. To continue this work we are fortunate to have secured the services of a Ministry-funded student achievement practitioner. Karen will update you on the outcomes of this important work during the next twelve months.

Finally I would like to wish everyone a great break from school routines. I know that many of our students and staff are fighting winter colds so the holidays are a much needed time for rest and recuperation at this time of year. They are also busy times for students and staff as they prepare for the demands of Term 3. I hope that you are all able to take some time to create some family memories and enjoy a break from the normal school routines.

HILLARY House

As Term Two draws to a close Hillary House can reflect on what has been a very successful term for us collectively and for many of the individuals in our House. Our House motto, a quote from Sir Edmund Hillary "It's not the mountain we conquer but ourselves" rings true for many of our students as they tackle the challenges of their busy school and personal lives.

The inter-House Competition has provided opportunities for students to compete in three competitions. These were Senior Debating, Junior WinterFest and the Year Level Quiz Competitions. Our Senior Debaters battled it out and won the event outright. Our Junior WinterFest, which consisted of Girls' Netball and Boys' Football played well but against strong opposition the best we could manage was fourth. Perhaps the final blow of the term came in the Year 9, 10 and 11 Interhouse Quiz Competition, where we placed fifth in each year level for the event. This has meant that overall Hillary is now in third place, 1.5 points behind Rutherford in second place and 21.5 points behind Mansfield in first place. Our strong work from the start of the year keeps us in contention but we will need to consolidate some higher placings in the remainder of the events this year if we are to have a shot at winning the competition. Coming up early in Term 3 we have the Choir competition, FilmFest and Senior WinterFest.

Our Year 13 Student Leaders continue to do an amazing job and we are very appreciative of the time and commitment they have given us as a House. Continuing with our leaders, in the final week of Term 2, three Hillary students, Serenity Bruce, Ella Gorton and Hannah Powell, attended the Christ's College annual Emerging Leaders' Conference, a one day event for Year 12 students from schools throughout Canterbury. As with other years, a line-up of inspiring and successful speakers and workshop presenters allowed students to consider what leadership means to them, and to reflect on ways to develop their own personal skills.

At this stage of the academic year, our senior students have just 14 weeks left and the juniors have 19 weeks left. For both groups live assessment feedback reporting provides valuable feedback for students from their teachers on how they are progressing. Significant progress and value can be added in Term 3 even where a student has fallen behind, but that action must be started soon before time runs out and it is too late.

To both staff and students thank you for your efforts in the first half of this year and I hope that wherever you find yourself and whatever you are doing, you manage to get some time to relax and unwind after a very busy term.

Welcome to July - and for those of you who like to accumulate arcane facts about months of the year, did you know that seven US presidents have died in July, which is more than any other month.

We began week 9 of Term 2 languishing in sixth place on the House Points Table, and while it's not all about winning, it's fair to say that we were feeling a little bit hoha about affairs. The great news is that we begin week 10 in fourth place! Year 9 followed and our quizzers felt just short of first place finishing in a highly commendable second equal position.

The final quiz involved our Year 11 cohort who repeated their heroics from 2016 by winning the title.

Exciting happenings in the Digital Technologies Curriculum area

Digital technologies are transforming how we live – shaping our homes and our workplaces, and changing the way that we interact with each other and live our everyday lives. It is vital for students to develop critical thinking skills working with 21st Century tools to equip them to shape their career, their lifestyle, their leisure.

The draft Digital Technologies Curriculum to be introduced in 2018 for students from Years 1-10, was released last week by the Minister of Education, Nikki Kaye. These are exciting times for us. This term we organised Code Club Aotearoa to provide our contributing primary schools the opportunity to develop their knowledge, confidence and skill in coding and computational thinking in preparation for the introduction of this curriculum.

The following events were undertaken during Term 2 so that our students had the opportunity to connect with current digital trends and career paths.

Christchurch Girls' Shadow Tech Day for Girls 2017

This was a day organised in conjunction with Ara for secondary school girls in Years 9 -11 'to come, experience and see for themselves the variety of interesting and rewarding careers in ICT and Engineering'. This was a nationwide event to address demand for skills in the ICT and Engineering industry sectors. The girls went to Ara and Intergen – a software company in Christchurch that 'specialises in the design, development and integration of business knowledge, information technology and creativity'. They all had a most enjoyable and motivating day.

Year 11 students – The Mind Lab

The students were given the opportunity to engage with The Mind Lab philosophy of 'offering learning experiences that support the development of the next generation of makers, doers, inventors and creators who will shape the future with new ways of working, thinking and living.' Students really enjoyed their experiences with Aurasma (Augmented Reality). Virtual Reality (VR) using Occulus and S7 and programming M-Bots. Adrian Clark, the founder of the Augmented Reality company, QuiverVision (and Lecturer at the HIT Lab, UC) spoke to the students about his business journey.

Year 12 students – UC, Vision College, Ara

This day was organised to enable students to have a really good understanding of tertiary opportunities in the many digital areas and to ensure that they make correct subject choices for 2018 to enable their goals to be realised. At UC, Professor Tim Bell engaged the students with Computer Science, followed by presentations from staff from Software Engineering and The Hit Lab and the study and career opportunities available to them. Vision College staff discussed the web development and software engineering courses on offer at their campus and Ara gave us a 'hands on' experience focusing on software engineering and networking. All venues were well prepared for us and the students thoroughly enjoyed the day.

We are proud that we bring the real world to the class room, as well as taking the class room to the real world. We know there is significant value in stimulating imagination, motivation and vision for the future to encourage students to achieve all they can be.

It was an unforgettable trip for many students coupled with quality learning. As one of the staff attending it was certainly a super way to end the term and our students did us proud. A fantastic bunch to be around!

Senior Study

Year 11-13 students all have a range of study periods built into their timetable to support them with the demands of NCEA achievement. In order for you to have discussions with your child in regards to their use of this time, please note the following requirements for each year level:

Year 11

All Year 11 students have a supervised study lesson each Wednesday during Period 5. Unless your child is participating within a school sport team, all year 11 students are required to be on site and in class.

Year 12

All Year 12 students have the following options for their use of Wednesday, Period 5 study and may either:

a) Participate within a school team sport activity.

b) Attend a supervised subject specific tutorial with their subject teacher (eg. Year 12 Accounting with Ms McDonald) who will note their attendance via the office.

c) Parents with children who live in Rangiora that do not travel on a school bus, may write a signed letter or note to give permission for their child to study at home during this period. The signed letter or note must be given to the Dean of House, by your child, who will then issue a pass. With this in place, the Year 12 student must present the pass to the office and must sign out each Wednesday at 2.20pm before they leave the premises. Permission letters in regards to Year 12 study may be signed per term.

d) For the students who do not meet the above categories, all will be required to attend the Year 12 Career Pathways seminar held in Rakahuri.

An email was sent in regards to Year 12 Study, with a permission slip attached. If you would like your child to study from home, and are a resident of Rangiora, please either sign, scan and email your permission slip to me. Or indeed, please sign and return the slip with your child to hand to the Office or myself.

Student Achievement Interview Day

This year we have revised the process for Year 10, 11 and 12 students' subject selection. The process begins at the start of next term.

Week 1 - All students will have extended form times in week 1 of Term 3. Form Teachers will share information on the courses available at Year 10 and Levels 1, 2 and 3. Year 13 Form teachers will begin the Leaver Profile process.

Week 2 - Senior Subject Information Evening - Thursday 3 August, 5.30pm to 8.00pm - HOFs and/or Curriculum Leaders, Pastoral Teams and Careers staff will be in Rakahuri to answer any questions you may have regarding subject choices and future pathways.

Week 3 - SAID Day on Thursday 10 August will be with Form Teachers. The booking slots will be 15 minutes. Year 9-12 students will meet with their Form Teachers to discuss overall progress so far and plan choices for 2018. Year 13 students are expected to meet with Form Teachers to complete a 1-1 exit interview and to continue the 'Leaver Profile' process.

All students, Form Teachers and families will have access to information on the school website.

Appointment bookings will go live at the start of Term 3. We ask that all students meet with their Form Teacher. If there are no convenient Form Teacher time slots, the Dean and Head of your student's House will be available to meet.

We want our students and their whanau to be making informed decisions on their 2018 subjects.
