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A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

2024 has been a year to celebrate. It started with some fairly major construction projects to enhance teaching and learning at our school. The Rakahuri refurbishment was completed at the end of Term 1 with the separation of the open learning areas into more defined classroom spaces. This was a joint project between the school and the Ministry of Education. It was certainly a hot topic and our school was in the news on a regular basis with many calls regarding it being the downfall of modern learning. The reality of course, was that this had nothing to do with modern learning as a philosophy but rather was in response to an extensive review of how our students in our school liked to learn. I am happy to say that it has been a real success not only for teaching and learning but also for providing a space for our students to relax in especially during the colder winter months.

The end of the first term also heralded the completion of our new Building & Construction workshop. It is incredibly important for us to make sure that our school caters for the diverse needs of all its learners, and that includes providing pathways not just into higher education but also into the trades and other

vocational areas. There is a real demand for learning in areas such as the farm, building, hospitality and engineering. This new building shed is equipped with all the latest technology and will allow our students to really become deeply involved. Hopefully we will soon see some tiny houses come out of the programme.

The final building project was of course the whare, aptly named Te Ao Mārama. After consultation with our Ngāi Tūāhuriri upoko rūnanga Te Maire Tau and discussion about the school motto (Lux Cum Amore - Enlightenment with Friendship) he gifted the name Te Ao Mārama. This title has several meanings including "The World of Light", "The World of Enlightenment" and "The World of Understanding" which promotes peace and understanding and meshes well with the school motto. It also aligns well with our hopes and aspirations for all rangatahi who may learn in this building; that they may acquire knowledge and understanding in their education and future educational pathways. It is a beautiful building. We are all proud to have had a part in making it happen.





Currently our school is going through a period of stabilisation. We take very few out of zone students and our in zone roll consistently sits between 1600 and 1700. We expect this to stay fairly constant over the next few years as there is a balance between a population that is ageing and the large amount of new homes in the area. An area of our school that is not in a plateau is our Lighthouse Programme. The reputation of our Lighthouse continues to grow stronger and stronger and there is huge pressure on the numbers in this area. It is simply down to having the best possible team providing the best possible support for these fantastic students and we are very proud of this team's achievements.

We recently had our Senior Prizegiving and Year 13 Graduation. For the first time we held a full senior prizegiving and Graduation ceremony at the Christchurch Town Hall Auditorium, after our senior classes finished. This was a change on every level, as normally our prizegivings are year level based and held after examinations. This was a huge effort for our senior staff to organise and it was awesome! The reason for these changes was to give as many of our students the opportunity to see and be part of the occasion and this worked a treat. This celebration, along with the sports and cultural celebrations are some of the most important events we hold for our school and I am looking forward to adding in 2025, the Māori and Pasifika awards evening during Matariki.

Finally, I would like to thank a number of people. Thank you to Matua Remihana for stepping into the Principal role for Term 3 whilst I was on my sabbatical. The school and I were very fortunate to have such an amazing person to lead our school. The only downside was that I was a little nervous coming back...

Thank you to all the staff, both teachers and support staff who have given tirelessly this year to our school. It has been one of the most troublesome years that we have had to deal with due mainly to the poor implementation of NCEA Level 1. Because of the hard work of this group of people the impact on our students was kept to a minimum and the opportunities were maximised. We are nothing without the goodwill and hard work of our staff.

Thank you to the School Board for the time, effort and energy that they give so freely to our school. In a time where many Boards are struggling to get members, we are very fortunate to have a fantastic leader in Simon Green and a very talented, able and courageous Board. A special thanks to Tynisa for representing the student body so well.

Finally, I wish to acknowledge one very special person. Russell Henson will be retiring this year after 50 years of service to this school and this community.

- Russell taught his first Year 9 students in 1975 they would now be 63...
- Russell has taught around 7000 students in his time here. That's the same size of Amberley, Oxford and Pegasus combined...
- He has coached 7500 hours of sport that is the equivalent of 24 hours a day, for 52 weeks in a row...
- He has had 11 years of holidays!
- There are very few people who can celebrate 50 years of service to education, and even fewer in the same school.

Thank you for your service, Russell and we wish you all the best in your retirement, although I would not be surprised to see you around school in the years to come.

the forefront of education, equipping our students with the skills required for a rapidly evolving world.

COMMUNITY AND PARTNERSHIPS

Our relationship with the wider Rangiora community continues to strengthen, and we are grateful for the support from parents, local businesses, and community groups. LIBRARY

At the end of term one, the library relocated to Ōharua in the Rakahuri building. The new space has new mobile shelving and comfy seating. We continue to offer two teaching spaces with senior students taking advantage of the upstairs study area in Te Tauraka.

We have continued to provide displays to support school wide focus on events including Pink Shirt Day, Bully Free Week, Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori and Mental Health Awareness Week. The students enjoyed our Library Week participating in the following competitions and winning prizes: how many bookworms in the jar, guess the shredded book, finding golden tickets and designing a bookmark.

On Monday 2nd September, visiting author Anne Kayes inspired year 10 English students as she gave a talk on creative writing and where she educated us all on the backstory of her novel, including how the events of Apartheid inspired her debut young adult novel, 'In Our Own Backyard', which she wrote during the 2020 lockdown.

The library has been a busy hub for our students this year as a place to meet friends and enjoy the space in their free time. UNO is popular in our library during break times together with chess, board games and jigsaw puzzles.

Our home page provides access to the library catalogue, audio books and ebooks, together with our one stop 24/7 access point to support online learning with a wide variety of databases and research tools available. 

I came all the way to Rangiora High School with nothing but 'thank you' and 'sorry' in English.

I went on many trips with my third family this year. I would rather eat Leigh's food recommendations on every trip than eat any good sushi by myself.

I hope I can support the international students in my own way, making the most of every moment based on the advice that Jack, last year's international leader, wrote in his yearbook.







As the year at Rangiora High School unfolds, my journey from my previous school last year has been a pivotal chapter in my academic and personal development. Serving as one of the leaders of the International Student Council this year, I've had the unique opportunity to lead and learn from a diverse group of students.

Our activities this year have focused on deepening cultural awareness and fostering a sense of community among students from various backgrounds. We've celebrated different traditions and perspectives, which have enriched our school environment and broadened our worldviews.

CATTLE HANDLING

At the end of last year the Rangiora High School Cattle Handling team attended both the Northern A and P (Rangiora) and the New Zealand Agricultural (Christchurch) shows. This involved twice weekly training sessions preparing the cattle leading up to these events at Kay and Philip Worthington's Woolstone Park Lowline stud in Fernside. During these sessions the team learnt how to judge and assess cattle as well as how to break them in. Team members during this time were Samara van Wyk, Tara Browne, John Lundy, Harry Parish, Molly Cherry, Annabelle Birchler, Chantelle Stuart-Gardiner, Rueben Bester and Abby Hoggart.

On Labour Weekend 2023 the team attended the Northern A and P show where Woolstone was the only stud to enter beef cattle, but much success was found in the Handlers and Stock Judging competitions. In the Junior competitions John Lundy obtained a 2nd place and Chantelle Stuart-Gardiner a 3rd for Handlers, whilst Annabelle Birchler obtained a 1st and John Lundy a 2nd in stock judging. Meanwhile in the Senior competitions Samara van Wyk obtained a 2nd for Handlers, whilst Tara Browne obtained a 1st and Samara van Wyk a 3rd in stock judging.

Our focus then shifted to preparing for the New Zealand Agricultural Show which was held in Christchurch for a whole week in November 2023. Judging occurred over three days with many different breeds of cattle present including South Devon, Belted Galloway, Hereford, Angus, Beef Shorthorn, Charolais, Murray Grey and of course Lowline! The handlers competition was an all round success for the team with Molly Cherry earning a 2nd and Annabelle Birchler a 3rd in the Junior Handlers while

John Lundy gained a 2nd in the Intermediates and Rueben Bester another 2nd in the Novice Intermediates. All members of the team also competed in the stock judging and school teams' classes.

Early in 2024 the team returned to showing with Hamish Webb joining the team and Emily Pye returning after 6 months off. During this time period the team was again breaking in cattle and learning the "tricks of the trade". We attended a small cattle judging competition held at Woolstone due to the absence of this class at the one day Malvern and Oxford shows. The Malvern show was again a success for the team though in the cattle judging with many cattle gaining placings. Chantelle and Emily won their handlers classes as did Tai Matehaere who is a member of the team although still at primary school. A week later the team competed at the damp but rewarding Oxford show, where much competition was faced both in the cattle and herdsperson classes due to the large turnout of competitors.

In August the team came back from the winter break, and with the addition of Ramashka Tuboltsev and James Jones, is now working towards the coming Northern A and P Show, and a scaled-back New Zealand Agricultural Show. The team would like to thank Kay and the late Philip Worthington for giving RHS students the opportunity to show, and learn about caring for cattle for the past 15 years. Their dedication and commitment to showing cattle as well as agriculture generally has led many former team members to careers in Agriculture.

RETIEF BENEKE did his placement at Noel Leemings and at completion gained his retail certificate and they offered him part time work.



When senior exam leave starts in late October our senior students have an alternative programme which this year will see them out and about on Fridays, visiting the Antarctic Centre and Christchurch Airport, Ohoka market, biking the Pegasus trail for one group, and a movie trip.

GUIDANCE

As well as supporting students with one-on-one counselling, workshops, and various presentations, the Guidance Department has also seen the inception of several exciting new initiatives this year as we move towards a model of 'wellbeing for all'.

MANAAKI AMBASSADORS

Elise Brambley, with the support of Youthline, has been working alongside 23 incredible upstanders - The Manaaki Ambassadors - with an aim to help create a culture of care at Rangiora High School. They have supported wellbeing initiatives, mentored and tutored younger students, provided safe spaces for students who may feel alone, and welcomed conversations with those who are doing it tough. The first of its kind, this group has paved the way for future leaders of our kura to continue to support others.

ADVENTURE THERAPY

Adventure therapy is another exciting development for the Guidance team, led by Eamonn Lowe, who prior to training as a counsellor, was an Outdoor Education teacher at Kaiapoi High School. He is passionate about the benefits of spending time in nature, and how it offers a unique setting in which to form connections. Participants have been surprised by how their experience has benefited their wellbeing in unexpected ways.

WAYFINDING FOR LIFE

On 7 May we took 60 Māori and Pasifika students, including 15 from Kaiapoi High School, to Lyttelton Harbour, where they learned about the star compass, navigation, sailing knots and went onboard Hinemoana courtesy of Te Toki Voyaging Trust. The wayfinding framework provides a creative and cultural environment for rangatahi to fully explore who is on their waka, create an uplifting compass, understand the messages their body is telling them, self identify what can go wrong in life, and devise prevention plans.

EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTRE PARTNERSHIP

Kay Henson has continued to strengthen our wonderful partnership with the Rangiora Early Childhood Centre and its welcoming team of dedicated teachers. Each week, groups of students join Kay to work alongside children aged 2-5, fostering a positive and nurturing environment. This collaboration has been incredibly rewarding, with students showcasing their leadership, communication, collaboration, and negotiation skills. Their ability to build supportive connections, fueled by enthusiasm and energy, has been a highlight. As this initiative continues to thrive, we look forward to its ongoing growth and success for both students and staff.







KAI SHED

The Kai Shed initiative, born during the challenging COVID-19 period, has become an essential means of supporting and connecting with families beyond the school setting. Every Wednesday, Kay Henson leads a team of colleagues and a dedicated group of RHS student volunteers in preparing food parcels, which are then delivered to families who are open to a bit of extra support. This weekly outreach not only provides vital support during financially difficult times, but also strengthens the bonds between home and school.

EQUINE CONNECT

We have been very lucky to be able to work with a beautiful team of horses at Comcol for equine therapy. Twice a week, one of our counsellors, Toni O'Beirne, alongside a Comcol equine tutor has been taking small groups of students to this unique and safe environment to explore ideas such as relating to others, building self-awareness, responding to emotions, upholding and respecting boundaries, clear communication and much more, as modelled by our four-legged friends. The programme has been a great success, and we hope to continue to offer these psycho-educational and therapeutic experiences for our students.

On the heels of our Y9s being welcomed at our mihi whakatau, we were off to Boyle River Outdoor Education Center for our Year 9 Camp experience, and what a time we had! OUTDOOR EDUCATION

This year saw the return of Ilana Moir from maternity leave and Anya Souvorova from her travels. Within the Food and Nutrition faculty we welcomed Jenny Putnam and Kari Reid to the team. We were excited for the changes at Level One and looked forward to the return of full year courses across our subjects. From Term 2 onwards we farewelled Ilana Moir and welcomed Emma Harding back to the Health and PE team.

Food and Nutrition was offered across Year 11 with four classes, Year 12 with two classes and Year 13 with one class. We also had two classes of Year 12 internal food and one class of Year 13 internal food. The Year 13 class continued with the work the class of 2023 did, home cooked meals and recipes for Kai

Kartons with a Guidance Department.









Our Year 11 Food and Nutrition classes successfully cooked a meal individually to share with their whānau. They then reflected on how this affected and improved their wellbeing. This was a huge undertaking to set up for staff and students. The feedback has been very positive, so something to look out for in 2025.

Hospitality has also gone from strength to strength this year. We have had four classes in Year 11, three classes in Year 12 and one class in Year 13. Students have been learning a range of skills that can see them advance to further industry training or work placements.

We have been pleased to have a large number of students wanting to take Early Childhood studies at Year 12. This is always a popular course that offers practical life skills. With this large class we are looking forward to what is being offered in 2025.

We have had 19 classes across our Year 9 and 10 Foods programme. Students have taken food three days a week. Learning a range of different skills and techniques. We are excited to see a number of these students choosing to be with us in the senior school in 2025.

13 HOSPITALITY - BUDDING BARISTAS BUST BEANS!!

Students of year 13 Hospitality have again had the opportunity to run their own cafe - The 'Little Llama'. Using single origin organic beans brought from the Three Llamas cafe in Woodend. Our little cafe is set up in the

Rakahuri kitchen and operated for a couple of months. Students work in teams to set up and operate the cafe at morning break. They cover all aspects of café service and with some students specialising in the Barista skills.

Students have many opportunities to participate in hospitality catering situations, with the small café operation being a highlight for the year.



Health Education was offered across Year 11 with one class, Year 12 with two classes and Year 13 with one class. We hope that we will be able to have two Year 13 Health classes in 2025 and carry our cohort of learners through into their last year of secondary schooling.

The new standards at Level One are shared with Food and Nutrition and Health Studies. We successfully participated as a class in some practical learning which included, a visit to see Inside Out 2, a visit to Flex Fitness Rangiora and a visit from some self defence instructors, all of these experiences contributed towards our learning for Achievement Standard 1.1.

Level 2 classes experienced a rejig to their courses this year with the Resilience and Change unit being completed first, followed by the Sexuality and Gender unit and then finishing with the Health Promotion group assessment task.

Our Level 3 programme continues to be added to, including this year some expert visitors around Health Practices in order to develop students' knowledge and understanding when it comes to the practical, real world application of these practices.



The Year 12 Outdoor Education classes spent most of term 1 looking at Adventure Based Learning. The focus of the unit was around demonstrating knowledge of personal contribution to a group, participating constructively in a group outdoor activity and then evaluating their own and group performance on a High Ropes day. The day was very successful and the students found their own level of challenge on many of the high rope elements.

The Year 13 classes focussed on Sea Kayak in term 1. Time was spent looking at different aspects of sea kayaking whilst demonstrating knowledge of factors that contribute to group performance in an outdoor activity; apply knowledge of group processes while participating and evaluate personal contribution to the group performance. The unit culminated in a 2 day trip to Otāmahua (Quail Island)

In Term 2 our Outdoor Education Year 12 classes prepared and completed a two day tramp to Lake Daniell located in the Lewis Pass Scenic Reserve. The unit included learning about Leave no Trace and Environmental Care Codes, essential equipment when preparing for an outdoors trip, some navigation and food preparation.







Our Year 13 classes looked at issues in safety management in the outdoors, using Mountain Biking as the context. This included two practical days of biking, one of which was at the Rakahuri Trail and the other was at Bottle Lake and McLeans Island. After the trips they then analysed issues in Mountain Biking and chose safety management strategies to minimise these.

Physical Education in our kura was filled with a number of rich learning experiences promoting the importance and joy of: learning in, through and about movement.

Year 9 & 10 PE focused on creating positive movement experiences for all students, while developing a wide variety of skills.

With the integration of the new achievement standards at Level One. Year 11 Physical Education at Rangiora High School took on a new look through the combination of new ideas and tried and true concepts. A highlight of term two was the interclass basketball tournament where teams from across all six classes came together to compete against one another with an overall focus of kotahitanga; unity, togetherness.

Level 2 Physical Education was significantly popular this year with three Physical Education classes and two Sport and Recreation classes. This year's cohort understood the importance of physical activity, and found success in our courses through the application of our school values: respect/whakautea, contribute/tohaina, and aspire/wawatahia.

It was good to see an increase in numbers for Level 3 Physical Education in 2024. The increase saw two classes created which made class numbers more manageable than last year giving the students and teachers more ability to go into greater detail and explore more in depth analysis on assessments. The course remained unchanged from last year offering four compulsory Achievement Standards and a choice of two optional Achievement Standards. This allowed students to semi individualise their Level 3 course while still maintaining a supportive course structure which for the most part students appreciated and was reflected in their results.

Firstly, we listened to a talk. It was inspiring to see how Japanese could be used in our future careers and how learning a foreign language can give us an edge in the job market. We then attended classes covering various topics. It was great to feel part of such a large Japanese learning community and meet lots of new people.

JAPANESE TRIVIA NIGHT

Two teams were entered and competed with students around the country to test their Japanese cultural knowledge in the Japan Trivia Night 2024. Teams answered questions on sport, festivals, pop culture, geography, and food. We were proud of our efforts, and enjoyed trying yummy Japanese snacks and making new friends from other schools.

EXCHANGES:

There have been lots of opportunities for students to visit Japan this year!

IIZUKA HIGH SHORT TERM SCHOOL EXCHANGE:

We were lucky to start a sister school exchange with lizuka Senior High School in Fukuoka, Japan. 5 of their students came to visit us in August ranging from 2 weeks to 1 month.

For one week the students lived the life of a high school student in Tokyo. They stayed with host families, travelled in rush hour, attended classes and were invited to join club activities. SOCIAL SCIENCES

WE HAVE HAD ANOTHER FULL YEAR IN THE TE AO TANGATA/SOCIAL SCIENCES FACULTY. WITH MANY LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES INSIDE AND OUTSIDE OF THE CLASSROOM.

JUNIOR COMMERCE

In Year 9 Commerce, students dived into exciting activities that brought the world of business and economics to life! From exploring personal needs and wants to creating their own currencies, students enjoyed hands-on projects and engaging lessons. They learned the origin of New Zealand bartering and took part in the red paperclip challenge where students had a week to trade up from a red paper clip to something of more value (winners included a coconut, a pair of shoes, and a boat!). Students also took part in a creative inquiry where they researched global challenges such as the environmental impacts created by the decisions of Olympic host countries.

In Year 10 Commerce, students embarked on an exciting journey of teamwork, innovation, and enterprise! Highlights included the Trash to Fash competition, where they turned everyday items into fashionable creations, and the popular Market Day, where 40 businesses have designed, marketed, and sold their own products. Through activities like the Chip Challenge and Paper Chain competitions, students developed communication and negotiation skills. They also tackled real-world business concepts, from demand curves to break-even analysis, all while exploring how businesses impact people and the planet.

JUNIOR SOCIAL STUDIES

Our year 9 ākonga have used the overarching theme of "Te whai ahunga, te manaaki i ētahi atu me te manawaroa/ Having a purpose and being empathetic and resilient" in their junior programme. This has included ākonga working on and developing a variety of Social Science skills including; recognising the strengths and limitations of different social action campaigns, analysing perspectives and considering why people think and act the way they do, considering the validity, reliability, and bias of different sources, and investigating the idea of cause and effect. In Term 4, ākonga had the opportunity to participate in the planting of natives on our whenua/farm as part of the new direction and development plan that is being undertaken in this space.

Year 10 ākonga have used the overarching theme of "Te whai ahunga, te manaaki i ētahi atu me te manawaroa/Having a purpose and being empathetic and resilient" to explore many different contexts from Aotearoa past and present. As well as a number of overseas contexts which have included both historical and current case studies. Ākonga have incorporated and developed numerous Social Science skills throughout the year including; understanding values behind diverse perspectives, presenting reasoned arguments,

generating a range of solutions for societal problems, and making informed judgements about people's actions in the past. Ākonga had the opportunity, in Term 4, to do a walking tour of some of Rangiora's significant memorials dedicated to those who have fought in past conflicts.

ACCOUNTING

Year 12 Accounting in 2024 was an exciting journey of discovering the ins and outs of business finance. Students dove into real-world applications of accounting through hands-on experiences like mastering Xero accounting software, learning about inventory management, and forecasting cash flow. The highlights included creating cash flow forecasts for businesses and working on accounts receivable systems, all while developing essential skills for future careers in accounting. Whether it was managing "virtual kayaks" or navigating financial reports, this course made understanding business numbers both fun and practical!

ECONOMICS

The classical definition of Economics - satisfying unlimited needs with limited resources - has been brought alive throughout the year. News headlines regarding egg prices (inflation and governmental regulation), tax cuts (distribution of wealth and government spending priorities), immigration policy (labour market and unemployment), the NZ-EU free trade agreement (international trade), and many others have provided our students with real-time, real-world examples to use in learning how to analyse and understand the economic ramifications of the decisions made by our political and business leaders. As I write this our students are completing achievement standard 91228: Analyse a contemporary economic issue of their own choosing using economic models and concepts. The different issues chosen by students have been fascinating, while their ability to understand these issues is gratifying.

HISTORY

Level 1 History has had a successful and enriching year, with students engaging in a diverse range of historical topics from New Zealand and around the world. We explored significant historical figures and passive resistance movements, including the powerful example of Parihaka in New Zealand. Other notable events we studied include the Aberfan disaster, the eruption of Pompeii, and student-chosen topics such as the French Revolution, the Erebus disaster, and the

9/11 terror attacks. Through these studies, students have developed critical skills in analysing sources and conducting research. They also explored the heroic efforts of everyday New Zealanders during World War II in preparation for a potential invasion. A field trip to Godley Head to study coastal defences and learn about the history of Ōtamahua/Quail Island is set to further enhance their learning. This year has fostered a deeper understanding of both global and local historical events.

LAW

On Thursday 12 September, Year 12 law students had the exciting opportunity to go on a field trip that gave us a deeper look into the legal system. We explored the Justice Precinct in Christchurch specifically the district and high courts, and the police communication centre. The trip provided a great opportunity to link what we learned in class to actual experiences and observe the inner workings of the justice system. In the Christchurch courts, we had the opportunity to enter real courtrooms and witness actual cases in progress. Witnessing court proceedings in real life enabled us to observe the interactions between judges, attorneys, and accused individuals, as well as the process of presenting legal arguments. After our visit to the courts, we explored the Christchurch police station. This part of the trip was just as interesting, giving us a glimpse behind the curtain of law enforcement operations. We were educated on the important function of dispatchers in handling emergency calls and organising responses. Observing their responses in different scenarios made us realise the significance of clear communication in maintaining the safety of the community. We also had the opportunity to learn about the various positions in the police department, from officers who patrol the streets to detectives, learning about their everyday duties and obstacles. In general, the field trip was a priceless experience. Through witnessing actual court proceedings and delving into the operations of a police department, we enhanced our comprehension of how the legal system operates

in real life. This direct experience will benefit us during our next assessment and has improved our educational experience even further.

PSYCHOLOGY

Ākonga in Year 13 Psychology have been introduced to a variety of new key concepts and approaches within the subject including, factors of obedience and conformity and the significance of this in terms of key psychological studies. Our ākonga have been exposed to new theoretical approaches and have investigated complex medical conditions and treatments. Term 3 saw students practise within the discipline of psychological research, with consultation, in the form of designing, operating and evaluating an experiment of their choice. Once again, this group of students have produced work of the highest quality, and it has been an absolute pleasure to have been part of their continued learning journey.

SENIOR SOCIAL STUDIES

Social Studies as a subject opens up career pathways into Social and Community Services. We have spent the year helping others, having gentle debates and inquiring into what is and isn't fair (ethics). Ākonga have undertaken inquiries into a range of current issues, helping us to become more aware of how decisions are made and how these decisions affect people. We have had many conversations that challenge how things are done in our society [in NZ and in our world]. As part of the course, students also participated in a localised Social Action - an act of kindness; a deliberate move to support our community. He taonga rongonui te aroha ki te tangata. Goodwill towards others is a precious treasure.

TOURISM

Ākonga in Year 12 and 13 Tourism this year have learnt about many exciting aspects of the industry. In Y12 we looked at tourism destinations in Aotearoa and around the globe and at the types of roles that we could work in such as accommodation and tourism activities. In Y13 we looked at specific destinations in Australia and the Pacific. We also deep dived into our own backyard looking at Māori Tourism and its cultural significance.

We received visits from leading tourism schools such as Queenstown Resort College to get us excited about prospective careers in Tourism.



We especially enjoyed learning about the industry placements provided that take place not only around Aotearoa but also the world. He kōrero tēnei e pā ana ki tētahi haerenga ki Te Whakatakaka O Te Ngarehu O Ahi Tamatea. I reira, i kitea i mātou ētahi waiariki. He pai kia tātau ngā waka kōpana. E tino pīrangi ana ngā ākonga ki te hoki atu. Te pai hoki o te haerenga!





This year we went to Hanmer Springs, where we enjoyed some iconic Tourism experiences, unique to Aotearoa. We especially enjoyed the Hot Pools and the Jetboats. It was a great trip and as a school, we will return to this beautiful area.

BUSINESS STUDIES

In Year 12 we focus on the promotion of NZ as a country of small businesses. While the products and services on offer vary tremendously there are several concepts that are common to all successful businesses. Students in Business Studies have been learning about some of these concepts. Concepts students have studied include: (1) How to interact with customers professionally; (2) How to be a positive, productive team player in a business environment. (3) How to foster innovation; (4) How to manage risk. It has been gratifying to see the progress students have made as they prepare to enter the workforce or begin their own businesses in our community.

In Year 13 our group businesses have been working hard throughout the year on their start-ups and have been encouraged along the way by the Young Enterprise Scheme (YES). We attended a product ideation workshop at Kaiapoi High School, had a competition about market research which we used to validate our product, got involved in a pitch competition where local business owners from the community came to give us feedback and direction and have recently completed a sales and marketing competition, where one group Woolago got full points! Every group has put themselves out there,

contacting local businesses, met with suppliers and vendors, being active on social media and bringing their friends and whānau along for the journey. Woolago is going to be speaking about their business journey on Compass FM. It's real-world experiences like this that are our highlights in this course.



GEOGRAPHY

The level 1 Geographers have had an action packed year, filled with field-trips and a wide variety of contexts to apply to the new NCEA structure. On the whole, it has gone very smoothly and has helped our ākonga develop new skills and refine existing ones. We had two 1 day field-trips in 2024. The first to the Rakahuri/Ashley River to collect data related to our focus based around if we can swim in our local awa/river. The students came up with a variety of answers and enjoyed learning from some experts from ECAN about how to test water quality and clarity. In Term 3 we travelled into Christchurch to go to Quake City where we learnt about the impacts of the Christchurch Earthquakes, this was followed by a walk around the city centre to see some of the rebuild, such as Te Pae, Margaret Mahy Playground and the new stadium being built. Ākonga have come away from Level 1 Geography with a renewed understanding of where things are, why they're where they are and why we should care. Toitū te marae a Tāne-Mahuta, Toitū te marae a Tangaroa, Toitū te tangata. If the land is well and the sea is well, the people will thrive.

Level 2 Geography has had a highly successful year, with several engaging and hands-on learning experiences. A highlight was our two field trips, the first being to the Styx Reserve, where students carried out research on the local waterway, gaining valuable insights into environmental processes. The second was an overnight trip to the Cass Field Station near Arthur's Pass, where students studied the issue of Wilding Pines and contributed to community service by participating in pine control efforts. Throughout

the year, we explored a range of fascinating topics, including the population decline in Detroit City, Tropical Coral Reefs, and the environmental challenges posed by Wilding Pines in New Zealand. These experiences have enriched students' understanding of both local and global geographic issues. Ko au te whenua, Ko te whenua ko au. I am the land and the land is me

















In 2024 Level 3 Geography has led our ākonga to many different places and contexts, both physically and virtually. We began the year with an overnight field-trip to Kaikōura to study coastal processes. Since then we have explored coral reefs, current issues; such as a proposed airport at Tarras and Thar culling, where malaria currently exists and why, and how to conduct geographical research in the field.



Throughout the year our Level 3 Geographers have developed their GIS (Geographic Information Skills), as well as exploring and understanding different perspectives on a variety of issues and challenges. Inā kei te mohio koe ko wai koe, I anga mai koe i hea, kei te mohio koe. Kei te anga atu ki hea.

In the art department, we planned a Year 11 trip to the Christchurch art gallery led by Priya Mehrotra and Sandy Gottermeyer. This experience inspired our students to start off the new NCEA Level 1 and was the perfect way to begin the course.

Art students from Year 11 to 13 participated in the Kaiapoi art exhibition, which was a huge success. The high level of work shown was impressive, and anyone who attended the exhibition would have been proud of the calibre of work produced by our young artists.

Our Media department is led by the dream team of Peter Courtney and Amanda Peter, who have had our seniors fully engaged while creating music videos and introduced stop motion to our juniors. In Design, the students stretched their imaginations to create promotional work for an event of their choice.










TECHNOLOGY



A variety of challenges and successes have been had in the Technology Faculty in 2024. There is such value in seeing things through to completion, a sense of accomplishment in doing our best with the time we have, and the reward of well finished projects. This year we bid farewell to John Wardle, who had been here for more than ten years as our Workshop technician, when he returned to the Isle of Man with his sweetheart this year. At the start of Term 1 we awaited the arrival of E3, the new Building and Construction Shed, and she finally arrived in Term 2 with a bright new floor, space, height and machinery that will serve our senior building classes well. Mr David Woodcock worked really hard to transform H5 into a Technology makerspace for Junior Technology.







He along with Mrs Cartwright have taught design technology, unleashing laser cutting and 3D printing in the junior school options. We are really grateful for them and for the Board and our Senior Leadership Team who made these things possible.

In building classes students were constructing a minimum of two durable projects. Beginning with a portable picnic chair which could be carried as a small case-sized item. This involved using all the machines in the workshop as the students began with the raw, rough-sawn untreated pine all the way through to the finished article. The main joints were housing and dowel joints as we had a nail & screw-free year except for the attachment of the vinyl backing.

For this we used decorative screws which, combined with the colour of the backing and the natural colour of the timber, made for a pleasing aesthetic. The second project was a side table which again used no screws and a fairly complicated biscuit joint at the base of the legs.

There was a great deal of Maths used to calculate the angles at the biscuit joint and a lot of fine craftsmanship in making these fit accurately and neatly, a source of protracted frustration for some students.

The finished articles were varnished to add to their durability. In addition to these, a brief foray into the world of concreting was experienced for two weeks as the students were charged with making moulds for a concrete paver and then to mix, compact and cure said pavers to complete the order. Students worked in groups for this project and it was great to see some tuakana/teina connections being made.

Level 1 engineering has seen the students applying the skills they have developed on the lathes, milling machines and MIG welders to make two very specific products to a close tolerance.











The tool maker's clamp and tack hammer are both made from mild steel with the added demands of producing brass and aluminium lock nuts. Students have used their time productively and made these very useful and durable tools. Students who finished early to the required standard were then able to choose from further demanding projects such as an infinity cube or a 100mm x 100mm die.





Some creative Design and Visual Communication work has been produced by our senior students. A broad variety of project ideas and visual communication techniques have been a highlight this year. Students have shown talent for using digital technologies using a Sketchup and Lumion combination for the first time to present their design outcomes. In Year 11, students have been working on a project for our Kura Whenua design concepts for a pā harakeke shelter for preparing harakeke, or an agricultural learning hub where students from around our rohe could come and learn about our farm and the many projects and learning opportunities it will provide.
















Fashion and Textiles classes relocated to room G12, where Mrs McLorinan has created an ideal work space and lovely learning environment. We have offered many Textiles and Fashion Technology classes this year. We really want our community to understand that this subject is not sewing. It is a high level design subject where students learn techniques and processes that would allow them to work in the design industry developing textiles based products. This involves client liaison, design skills, and making skills using a variety of techniques. Everyone has been busy designing and creating an amazing array of garments and articles and learning a lot of new skills at the same time.



With the updated curriculum, Year 9-11 students have had chances to learn about a variety of Digital Technology outcomes, including computer science, electronics, programming, web design and image editing. The break time Minecraft and gaming club continues to be popular. The new robotics team has continued to develop new skills with their new VEX robot, with the goal to compete in the national tournament in 2025.









CREATIONS!

Members of the electronics club continue to develop their skills and knowledge. One of the biggest highlights of the year was seven Year 11 girls visiting Jade Software Corporation Limited as part of ShadowTech Day. The girls had an interesting and varied day, learning about the vast array of career opportunities in the Digital Technologies field. The department is looking forward to 2025, and the many opportunities the new year will reveal.

Year 9 Technology classes have been focused on design and creating products using the laser cutter. They started out by making Laser cut letter art to familiarise themselves with the design process and introduce basic skill on the software program that drives the laser cutter. See some of the great examples of what the students achieved. To push their skills further they then designed a clock that included a repurposed component and introduced themselves to more complex design tools on the laser cutter software. Some brilliant creations have been created throughout the year.









A special shout-out to our Year 12 and 13 students across the faculty who will or have already moved on to work and tertiary studies. 


We are all so happy for Bella, and proud of what the entire group accomplished.



ATHLETICS



Joe Hussey also shone by earning 2nd place in the U16 discus event. Harry, Cody, Joe, and Brooke Hussey (who finished 5th in both the 1,500m and 3,000m) qualified for the South Island Athletics Championships. However, only Harry and Brooke were able to attend.

The 2024 season will go down as one of the best seasons ever for the Rangiora High School Boys' Football 1st XI. The team was initially placed in a pool of seven teams and after victories over Rolleston, Burnside, Middleton Grange, Shirley Boys' and a draw with CBHS the team qualified for the Top 8 Premier Division. In this round the team beat St Bede's and Christ's College. The win against Christ's claimed RHS the Connectics Challenge Shield for the first time ever. After this, we once again drew with Boys' High. The boys went on to beat CBHS and Cashmere to finish a creditable 5th place- the highest the team has ever achieved in the competition.

The team also qualified for the National Premier tournament in Auckland for the first time in 10 years. Initially missing out on the top four automatic qualifying positions, the team received a wild card having beaten three of the top four sides. They also won the traditional interschool vs Ashburton College convincingly.

After some quick fundraising the team headed off to Auckland to face the best teams in the country. After very close losses to St Kentigerns College, St Paul's and Wellington College the team played off for 17th -32nd positions. We achieved a 1-1 draw with New Plymouth Boys' High but lost on penalties. This

was followed by a tough loss to Hutt International as squad numbers and tired legs began to be a problem. However, the boys really turned it around on the last two days to finish with great wins over Scots College 3-2 and Lindisfarne 4-4, a game we went on to win on penalties. A final placing of 29th does not reflect how good the team was and, but for a few more things going our way, we could have finished a lot higher.

We had a big goal at the start of the year to qualify for Nationals and they should feel incredibly proud that they achieved this. Throughout the whole season the boys played to their absolute potential every week. They worked incredibly hard on the pitch and played some quality football. A great team spirit was developed and they achieved a number of "firsts" and are undoubtedly the best first 11 team I have coached in 25 years. OTP!

The team was ably led by skipper and four year Veteran Harrison Bint. Very strong defensively, he developed his ability to play out from the back across the season. He scored a memorable goal in the dying minutes in his last game to force penalties at the tournament. He made a great centre back pairing with Connor Page and they formed arguably the best combination in the league. Another very strong defender, composed on the ball with an ability to drive forward, Connor was awarded the teams MVP and was also MVP at Tournament.



In goal Will Bint was strong in the air and helped the team play "total football" from the back. He made 4 memorable saves from penalties at the Tournament. Luca Molina was forced to play out of position at left back but did the job admirably. He is a natural athlete with a tenacious defensive attitude who had a strong finish to the season at tournament. Finn Turnham, Noah Roddis and Mark Ferguson mostly filled in the full backs position. Finn has good technical ability and will develop further in future years while Noah played some strong games and showed versatility covering several positions. 








OCEAN SWIMMING
